3. Busy as a bee	Extremely busy.	It's almost Christmas so everyone is <b>busy as a bee</b> buying gifts.
4. Let the cat out of the bag	To reveal a secret.	I am planning to have a surprise party for him, so I asked his friends not to <i>let the</i> cat out of the bag.
5. At a snail's pace	[Something or someone is] moving very slowly.	Traffic is moving <b>at a snail's pace.</b> We've been here for more than an hour.
