Idiomatic Expressions		
1. Three strikes and you're out	When a player is batting in a baseball game and they get three strikes, they are out of the game. This is often used to talk about someone's track record (or their past performance). If they make three, then you are no longer willing to give them more chances.	<i>Ken missed the deadline again. That's two strikes now. Three strikes and he's out.</i>
2. Hit a home run	A home run is where a player runs through all four bases and scores for their team. To hit a home run means to do a fantastic job on something.	<i>Ken could learn a thing or two from you. I haven't seen him hit a home run like that in a long time!</i>
3. The ball is in your court	In tennis, when the ball is on your side of the court, it is your turn to hit the ball. This is used to mean that it is someone's turn to take action or make the next move.	<i>I don't know, Ken. I'm working now. The ball is in your court</i>
4. game plan	strategy (from the game of football)	I do not know if my boss has a game plan for the meeting.
5. hit the bull's-eye	to achieve your goal perfectly	We hit the bull's-eye when we got the big sales contract.
