WORDS TO DESCRIBE the WEATHER	
Hot weather: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Stifling – hot, uncomfortable, hard to breath 2) Humid – hot and damp 3) Scorching – extremely hot, can be used in positive situations 4) Boiling – very hot, usually used in negative situations 	Wet weather: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Damp – mildly wet weather 2) Drizzle – very light rain 3) Downpour/pouring down – very heavy rain 4) Shower – raining for a short period of time
Windy weather: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Breezy – gentle wind, usually used in a positive way 2) Blustery – very windy, usually negative 	Cold weather: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Cool – mildly cold (cool air can often be pleasantly refreshing) 2) Chilly – slightly cold 3) Freezing – very cold 4) Biting – extremely cold

Expressions		
1. Get wind of something	To hear or learn about something that is supposed to be someone else's secret	He doesn't want his colleagues to get the wind of the fact that he's leaving.
2. Put (something) on ice	To delay or postpone something	I'm putting my plans for a new car on ice until I finish college.
3. Like greased lightning	Extremely fast	The thief ran like greased lightning when the police came.
4. Save something for a rainy day	To keep something (like money) for a time when it is needed.	It's hard to earn money so you should really save it for a rainy day .
5. Full of hot air	Boastful; talking nonsense	She talks like she knows everything, but she's just full of hot air .
