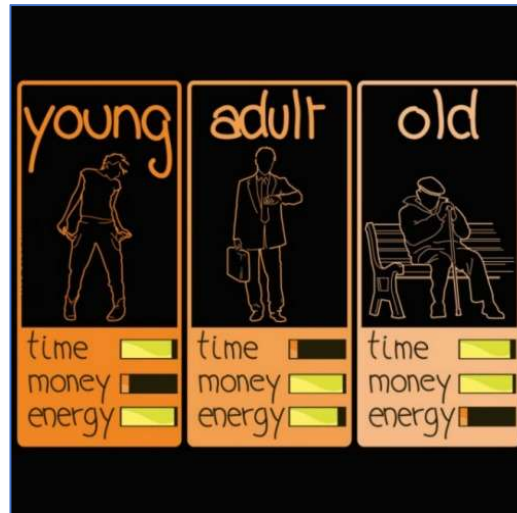

PHRASES FOR TELLING OR ASKING SOMEONE TO WAIT

- 1) **Could you give me a minute?** – used for telling someone to wait
- 2) **(Please) Hold on...** - used to asking someone to wait for a short period of time
- 3) **(Please) Bear with me.** – polite way of asking someone to be patient when you do or finish something
- 4) **I'll be right with you.** – used for saying that you are coming very soon
- 5) **All in good time** - used for telling someone to wait for something and not try to make you hurry
- 6) **Not so fast!** – used when you are telling someone to wait and not be too quick to do or believe something
- 7) **Hold your horses** - used when you are telling someone to wait and not be too quick to do or believe something

1. Third time's a charm	The third time you do something it will finally work	He finally managed to pass his exam. As they say, third time's a charm.
2. At the eleventh hour	Almost too late or at the last minute/moment	Mike always submits his projects at the eleventh hour.
3. In the nick of time	Just in time; at the last possible moment	It seems we got here just in the nick of time. We almost got late!
4. On someone's watch	While someone is in charge or someone is in duty	Anna has got a bruise on her leg again. Why do kids always get hurt on your watch?
5. Around (or round) the clock	All day and all night; for 24 hours, without stopping	Doctors and nurses worked round the clock to help those injured in the road accident.
