## WORDS FOR BODY MOVEMENT/GESTURES (Verbs)

- 1) shrug raise (one's shoulders) slightly and briefly to express that you don't know, don't care, or are not sure about something
- 2) clench close fingers or hand tightly, usually when you are very angry
- 3) bow bend the head or upper part of the body as a sign of respect, greeting, or shame
- **4) nod** to move the head down and up again quickly, especially to show agreement, approval, or greeting
- 5) pout push one's lips or one's bottom lip forward, usually to show annoyance
- 6) wince to tighten the muscles of the face briefly and suddenly to show pain, worry, or embarrassment
- 7) pat to touch someone or something lightly and repeatedly with an open hand
- 8) fidget make small movements, especially of the hands and feet, usually to show that you are uncomfortable or bored
- 9) slouch stand, move, or sit in a lazy, drooping way (with the shoulders and head bent forward)
- 10) steeple a hand gesture where fingertips touch each other. Usually shows confidence or arrogance

1. keep a civil tongue	Used to tell someone to speak politely and decently	Children are always told to <i>keep a civil</i> <i>tongue</i> especially when talking to older people.
2. Give someone the cold shoulder	Ignore or treat someone in an unfriendly way	She <i>gave me the cold shoulder</i> after I refused to go with her to the party.
3. All ears	Very eager or ready to listen	Please tell me about your first day at the new job—I'm <b>all ears</b> !
4. Give someone a leg up	Help someone to achieve something, especially at work	Studying with Jane will <i>give you a leg</i> <i>up</i> for the exam. She knows Chemistry well.
5. Pay lip service to (something)	To express approval, respect, or support for something insincerely or without doing anything to support it	He doesn't really care about politics. He's just <b>paying lip service to</b> the candidate.
